

Fireside Chat with Dr. Robert L. Green at MSU

DR. ROBERT L. GREEN
— FIRESIDE CHAT —

Please join Professor Emeritus Dr. Robert L. Green, founding faculty member of James Madison College and former Dean of the College of Urban Development at Michigan State University, for a student fireside chat on grassroots protests and organizing social justice movements.

Dr. Green served as the education director of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference for Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. from 1965-1967. He also led the first MSU student march on campus the day following Dr. King's assassination.

Dr. Green has successfully related his writing and research to solve society's most pressing social, political, economic, and racial issues. His research and practice have focused on the impact of poverty and discrimination on urban minority populations. He is a national and international expert on expectations and how they affect student achievement.

Dr. Green's latest book, *The Crossroad of Fear and Freedom: The Fight for Educational and Social Justice*, focuses on his academic work nationally and internationally and his involvement with Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. and the Civil Rights Movement. Dr. Green has dedicated his life to helping others deal with fear - a lesson he learned personally from Dr. King.

Dr. Green will be at a fireside chat on Tuesday to meet and talk to students. Dr. Green worked for Dr. King's SCLC Education Committee, was the Dean of MSU's College of Urban Ed and is also a Professor Emeritus at MSU. MSU's BSA was founded in Dr. Green's basement and he led the first Dr. King march on campus in 1968. Lots of Hot Chocolate and Cookies will be served!

George Openjuru

Professor of Education and First Deputy Vice Chancellor, Gulu University, Uganda

George L. Openjuru is professor of education and first deputy vice chancellor at Gulu University, Uganda. He was formerly dean of the School of Distance and Lifelong Learning at Makerere

University, and head of the Department of Community Education and Extra-Mural Studies, Institute of Adult and Continuing Education. He was also an associate professor of adult and community education at Makerere University.

He holds a Ph.D. in adult education from the University of KwaZulu-Natal and has published a number of articles and book chapters about lifelong learning and adult literacy education. He chairs the Uganda Adult Education Network. His specialization is adult and community education, with specific focus on adult literacy education, educational exclusion and social justice, action research, community university engagement, lifelong learning, and indigenous knowledge and knowledge democracy. He is a partner with the UNESCO Chair in Community Based Research and Social Responsibility in Higher Education. He is also a member of the International Reading Association.
